Is your Lions club meeting the current needs of your community?

By completing a community assessment, your club may identify a need that can revitalize the passions of current members, and interest potential new members when asked to assist in new community projects or service. You community assessment should include opinions from various groups in the community and should include persons from different ages, jobs, and stages of involvement within the community.

Some signs that your club may be in danger of burning out current members or presenting other threats to your legacy of service include fewer members attending meetings or planning sessions

for projects; not bringing in guests, visitors, or a new member in the past year; or increasing negativity around club meetings and events.

It is normal for all groups to have a time when they become "stale". The important action is to acknowledge this and decide to try and change it. Remember, judgment has no place in Lionism.

Recognition, accepting that the situation exists, and working together to revitalize your group is what is important.

The time is NOW for clubs and individual Lions to take note. In the past twenty years, our Multiple District has lost nearly 16,000 members. At this rate our Multiple District will not exist in the next 20 years.

"Developing good orientation and mobility skills is the essential first step for someone who is blind. O&M skills allow people to get out of their home on their own to re-join their community, to find and keep gainful employment or return to school to reach their educational goals," said Erica Ihrke.

"When I went legally blind, the state sent me a cane and said, 'There you go,'" said David Kaylor. "In the United States, most O & M training is provided by government agencies and school systems. For adults, these agencies have vocational requirements designed for people to enter or return to the workforce. If the applicant does not plan on obtaining a job, they are ineligible for services. This leaves seniors, stay-at-home parents or people who are planning to retire without assistance. So, 20 years ago, Leader Dog filled this gap. After all, a majority of a person's life occurs outside of work."

Ideal candidates will have experience in finance, philanthropy, strategic planning or simply a willingness to serve for an organization that helps to restores sight and health to thousands every year. "Lead with Compassion" is the Peace Poster 2022-2023 theme

One of the great things Lions International has for young people is the Lions Peace Poster Contest. The contest is open to young people ages 11 through 13 (by Nov. 15). This year's theme is "Lead with Compassion" so youngsters would be able to express their visions of the theme through artwork.

Young people can create posters to express what the theme means to them. These young artists are encouraged to use bright colors, animals, faces, symbols, flags and other items for the posters.

No numbers, names or letters are allowed on the posters. Each poster size is to be no larger than 20x24 inches.

Your Lions Club provides the Peace Poster kit to the school or youth group. Kits can be purchased by Oct. 1 through the LCI Store (www.LionsClubs.org) and then search for Peace Posters. Under Peace Posters, there is a link to order the kit.

Posters are judged on originality, artistic merit and the theme. Submitted posters are first judged at the club level. The club's winning poster moves on to district competition. The top district poster moves onto the multiple district contest to complete with the winners from each of the six MD5 districts.

The winner from the multiple district contest moves on to international competition. The top two posters from each MD5 district will also be featured in the 2023-2024 MD5 Lions Peace Poster calendar.

The MD5 Peace Poster calendar is available for a \$10 contribution that supports LCIF. Clubs often provide monetary awards for first, second and third place.

Small token awards, such as candy bars or Rice Krispies Treats, are usually given to everyone who participates. The 5SE district provides a \$50 prize.

The grand prize LCI Peace Poster winner at the international level gets \$5,000 and a trip to the United Nations. There are LCI 23 merit awards recipients receiving \$500 each.

Mail your club winning poster so it is delivered before Oct. 31 to Lion Maxine Johnson, 2111 North University Rd., Vermillion, SD 57069. Be sure that the poster is sent in a round tube (rolled, not folded).
