

The Henry Baker Fellowship Award

Lions around the world have a reputation for being leaders in service in their communities. That leadership comes in many different forms in our clubs.

At times, it's a Lion who is a gifted communicator whose words inspire us all to do more than we thought possible. Or, it may be a Lion whose logical, organized, approach to challenges and opportunities just makes so much sense that we cannot help but follow the path forward being offered.

In still other cases, it's a Lion who simply leads by example; who is consistently present at club activities and projects; who is always one of the first to volunteer; who is one of the first to arrive and the last to leave a service activity; who constantly finds a way to show appreciation for what other Lions are contributing; who humbly demonstrates that "We Serve".

The Henry Baker Fellowship Award was developed to recognize this latter style of service leadership. Lion Henry Baker found joy in helping others. Though he could neither read nor write and spent much of his life institutionalized at the South Dakota Development Center in Redfield, Henry is remembered for what he gave to others.

As a 25-year member of the Redfield Lions Club, he earned the respect of the community for his good deeds, his friendliness and his enthusiasm. The South Dakota Past District Governors Association in 2004 created the Henry Baker Fellowship Award to recognize hard-working members of their community who were dedicated to service to others.

A \$300 contribution accompanies the award which the recipient may designate for either South Dakota Sight and Health or for the South Dakota Lions Foundation. Clubs or individuals can name multiple Henry Baker Fellows each year. A \$300 contribution must accompany each nomination.

One of our service roles as Lions can, I think, be viewed as serving each other as fellow Lions. In so doing, we contribute collectively to the effectiveness of our club in all service activities.
