- 3. Recognize the contributions of club members through your own club awards make them fun. We have formal awards through the district and LCI, and you are encouraged to award them, but we also need to be a little spontaneous and goofy.
- 4. Encourage members of your club to attend our district convention in Freeman on April6. Get a car load and come to the event. It is guaranteed to be fun and you will get to meet wonderful Lions from across the district.
- 5. Challenge yourself to invite at least one person to join your Lions Club. We have added 55 new members to our district so far this year, but we have dropped 31 members. Who are your newly retired or empty nest friends invite them. What about your sons and daughters have you asked them to continue your Lions legacy? How will you speak to young people about the service of Lions?
- 6. Call Lions clubs in your zone to see if you can work on a project together. Learn from each other.
- 7. Be adventurous attend the International Lions Convention in Melbourne Australia this June. If that seems a bit too far, plan to attend the Multi District 5 Convention in Minot, N.D., May 16-18. The registrations are included in this newsletter.
- 8. Volunteer to take a role on the District 5SE cabinet for 2024-2025. Dedicated individuals with a love for Lions are always needed.
- 9. Dedicate yourself to earning the Club Excellence Award for your club.
- 10. Help a neighboring community start a Branch Lions Club so Lions service can spread.
- 11. Donate individually to SD Lions Foundation and Lion Club International Foundation.

Let's make 2024 a year of renewal of purpose through bold ideas and dedication to Lions Service.

From pup to guide: Training puppies to become Leader Dogs



Training puppies to become Leader Dogs for the Blind is a meticulous and transformative process that begins with a purposeful breeding program. Professional breeders selectively pair dogs based on temperament, health, and suitability for guide work.

The carefully chosen puppies are entrusted to volunteer puppy raisers at around 7 to 8 weeks of age, who provide a loving home environment and crucial early socialization.

Puppy raisers play a fundamental role in instilling basic obedience and good manners in the young canines. They expose the puppies to various environments, sounds, and experiences, fostering adaptability and confidence.

The pups learn essential commands such as sit, stay, and come, laying the groundwork for the more advanced skills they will acquire later on. Around the age of one year, the puppies return to the Leader Dogs for the Blind training center in Rochester Hills, Michigan for formal guide dog training.

Professional trainers work intensively with the dogs, teaching advanced skills such as navigating obstacles, stopping at curbs, and responding to specific commands. Positive reinforcement and a focus on building a strong bond between trainers and dogs characterize this phase.

Once trained, the dogs are carefully matched with individuals who are blind or visually impaired, considering factors like personality and lifestyle. The matched pairs undergo intensive training together, emphasizing not just technical skills but also fostering a deep bond of trust.

Ongoing support ensures the continued success of these guide dog partnerships, ultimately empowering individuals to navigate the world with newfound independence and confidence. Since 1939, Lions Clubs around the nation have played a crucial role in providing financial support to this vital program through a myriad of fund-raising activities.



Club holds awards banquet, Lion Allen Brown honored for 59 years of membership



Dell Rapids Lions, spouses and friends gathered the evening of Dec. 7 to honor new and old Lions. A banquet was served by Cricket's Catering at the Dells Senior Citizen Center.

Special guest Lions District Governor LeeAnn Haisch of Alcester presented awards, including the Excellence Award for the club's 2022-23 accomplishments.

The focus of the evening, however, was on Lion Allen Brown who received the prestigious Melvin Jones Fellowship. Named for the founder of Lions Clubs International, it is the highest honor that club members can bestow on a fellow Lion.

Brown holds the longest membership in the Dells club, having joined Dec. 1, 1964, 59 years and counting. During that time, Brown served as club president and director, and has been a mainstay in every club project, activity and fundraising effort. "Like Melvin Jones, Allen Brown has put his intelligence, ambition and talents to work improving and serving his community," said Haisch in presenting the plaque to Brown.

Lion Carmen Rogen received the District's Proud Lion Award for meeting a list of requirements during her first year of membership. Rogen actually accomplished the work in less than six months after joining the club this past June.

The evening's agenda also included the induction of two new members by Membership Chair Lion Christine Snyder: Carolyn Drew, sponsored by Lion Marlowe Hovey, and Zach Rogen, sponsored by his wife, Lion Carmen Rogen.

Haisch concluded her remarks to the gathering with a reminder of how important Lions Clubs are to communities around the world. "How often are we asked: What do Lions do?" said Haisch. "The answer is simple: We do good for people."

- Member Retention Awards: MISSION 1.5 is your opportunity to emerge as a Lion leader, put your club on the map and show that serving side by side means growing stronger together.
- Premier Club Award: MISSION 1.5's Premier Club is a four-tiered, progressive award system with Premier, Silver, Gold and Diamond levels. There is an opportunity to advance one tier every Lion Year, but to reach Diamond status by 2027, Premier Club status must be achieved in the first year.
- Qualifying criteria: Gain a new MISSION 1.5 Premier Club award tier each year by achieving 100% retention, 10% growth, with a minimum of 5 new members Premier Club Award winners at and above the Silver Tier will also be recognized in LION magazine and at international convention.
- Platinum Club Award: There is a special place reserved at the top of the MISSION 1.5 mountain. It's an elite level only the most dedicated Lions clubs can attain. Lions always rise to the occasion. This is the occasion.
- Qualifying criteria: Retain 100% of existing membership and double club size by adding at least 20 new members Platinum Club Award winners will also be recognized in LION Magazine and at international convention.

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
